### Montezuma Castle NM: A Past Preserved in Stone (Contents)

The Montezuma Castle is a 90,000-square-foot (8,400 m<sup>2</sup>), 400 room Queen Anne style hotel building erected just northwest of the city of Las Vegas, New Mexico in 1886 (the site was at the time called "Las Vegas Hot Springs," but is now known as "Montezuma"). The current castle is actually the third on the site, the first two (dating to 1881 and 1885) were the first buildings in New Mexico to have electric lighting, and they both burned down.

Montezuma Castle was added to the National Register of Historic Places on October 15, 1966. It is an easy monument to visit, just a short distance off Interstate 17, at exit 289. There is a 1/3 mile (0.54 km) paved trail starting at the visitor center that follows the base of the cliff containing the ruins.

But just 5 miles outside of Las Vegas stands Montezuma Castle. Built as a destination hotel by the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad in 1886, this 90,000-square-foot Queen Anne structure was considered one of the places to visit at the turn of the century. As a luxury hotel, the castle capitalized on the area's natural hot springs, and was a gateway to the excellent trout fishing in nearby Gallinas Creek.

Montezuma Castle National Monument protects some of the best-preserved cliff dwellings in the American Southwest, including Castle A, the ruin for which the Monument is best known. These dwellings were built by the Southern Sinagua archaeological culture between A.D. 1100 and A.D. 1425. The Monument also manages Montezuma Well, located 11 miles away, and a number of surrounding smaller sites also of Sinaguan origin.
